# **Friendly Reminder**

An <u>Emergency Order</u> was issued by the city of Beverly requiring, among other things, all persons entering a commercial building complex to wear a face covering over their mouth and nose. The Order went into effect at 12:01 AM, Sunday, April 12, 2020, and will remain in effect until notice is given. As required, Cummings Properties has posted the Board of Health Notice at all entry doors at its Cummings Center and Dunham Ridge campuses.

Because face masks are in short supply, the Beverly health inspector provided helpful links from <u>CDC</u> and <u>U.S. Surgeon General Jerome Adams</u> regarding "do it yourself" face coverings.
